# Welcome to Safer Internet Forum 2024 Protecting children and young people against

inappropriate content and bullying online

The **Safer Internet Forum (SIF)** is a key annual international conference in Europe where policy makers, researchers, law enforcement bodies, youth, parents and carers, teachers, NGOs, industry representatives, experts and other relevant actors come together to discuss the latest trends, opportunities, risks and solutions related to child online safety and making the internet a better place.

This year's edition will take place in a hybrid format in Brussels, Belgium and online on **Thursday, 21 November 2024** with a theme of **Where's the harm? Protecting children and young people against inappropriate content and bullying online**.

The past 12 months have seen heightened concern globally around the potential dangers and risks to children and young people online, including cyberbullying, which remains the most common reason for contacting Insafe helplines. Campaigns to ban the use of social media and smartphones for younger teens have gained traction, and more legislation and regulations are being enacted.

For example, <u>an expert panel was convened in France</u> late last year to address rising concerns about excessive screen time and its effects on youth, including mental health and developmental issues, and released a set of recommendations including barring young children from having smartphones and limiting social media use to those 15 and older. <u>In Italy, new guidelines have been issued banning the use of smartphones and tablets</u> in classrooms in kindergartens, primary schools, and lower secondary schools, extending an existing ban on non-academic use of these devices.

Against this background, Safer Internet Forum 2024 will place a particular focus on pillar one of the BIK+ strategy: safe digital experiences and, more specifically, how to protect children and young people against inappropriate content and bullying online.

The Forum aims to take stock of the new DSA rules and their implementation, discuss the risks of exposure to potentially harmful online content and behaviour, including cyberbullying, and explore the tools and strategies currently available or needed to mitigate these risks.

# The event is being organised in a youth-led manner, with young people playing an active role in the planning, preparation and delivery of the Forum.

### We take this opportunity to thank the members of the SIF Youth Advisory Group, BIK Youth Panel, and International Youth Panel for their dedication and commitment to helping to create a safer and better internet for their peers, and young people across the globe.

As is typical of the Safer Internet Forum, participants will have the opportunity to participate in a youth-led workshop and a deep dive session.

- Online participants will have the opportunity to tune into the youth-led workshop on cyberbullying and hate online. A separate deep dive session will take place in the virtual meeting environment for online participants.

### Vincent, Croatia

My name is Vincent, I am 19 years old, and I'm currently a college student studying in Croatia. My field is philosophy and art history, and besides college, I also volunteer at my national Safer Internet Centre. I have participated as a member of the BIK Youth panel in 2023 and 2024, but this is my first year as a SIF Youth Ambassador. # **BIK Youth Panel 2024**

Each year, a Better Internet for Kids (BIK) Youth Panel is organised prior to and during the Safer Internet Forum (SIF). Drawn from national youth panels convened by Safer Internet Centres across Europe, BIK Youth Panellists are encouraged to voice not just their personal opinions and challenges, but also those of their peers whom they are representing at a European level.

Since the beginning of September, through a series of online meetings, BIK Youth Panellists have been actively preparing their contributions to this year's Forum by sharing their respective perspectives on better and safer internet issues with their peers, agreeing on key themes, and preparing awareness materials on these topics.

In the days preceding this year's Forum, a group of 28 BIK Youth Panellists from 21 European countries have come together, face-to-face in Brussels, to finalise their work which they will present throughout the course of the day. Together with the SIF Youth Advisory Group, they will also lead various workshop sessions, to ensure that their voices can inform the perspectives of the various stakeholders participating in the Forum, and influence ongoing work in this field.

# **International Youth Panel 2024**

This year, for the first time, we welcome young people from across the globe to participate in youth panel activities. Young people from Albania, Armenia, Brazil, Turkey, the UK, and Ukraine will participate in the Forum person, while young people from Australia and Ghana will also join online.

### **Henry Adams**

### Resolver, United Kingdom

Henry Adams is Director of Trust and Safety (strategy, partnerships and policy) at Resolver, a Kroll business. He has spent the past decade working across domains to mitigate risk in high-harm settings. Henry is a former Head of Intelligence with a background in counter terrorism, national policing operations, and crisis negotiation. At Resolver, he initially led global intelligence operations with a focus on rapid response services, before overseeing product development of advanced network analysis capabilities. Today, Henry leads Resolver's strategy and engagement with wider industry, as a passionate advocate for the protection of children online and a proponent of the power in taking proactive intelligence-led approaches to online safety.



### **Justine Atlan**

### Association e-Enfance/3018, France

Justine Atlan has nearly 20 years of experience in child protection in the digital world. A lawyer in public law (Paris 5 René Descartes- Faculté de MalakoG), she trained in family mediation (ICP-Institut Catholique de Paris) after a career as a journalist in the written press for ten years (Agence Regards, HFM group, Emap group). Since 2010, she has been the general director of the e-Enfance Association for the protection of children on the internet (2005, recognised as being of public utility, approved by the Ministry of National Education, Youth and Sports) and of the national number 3018 - against harassment and digital violence. As a member of the Insafe/Safer Internet programme network of the European Commission as Director General of 3018, she participates in prefiguring the model of the "trusted flagger" formalised by the Digital Service Act (DSA) in 2023.

As Director of the Association, Justine is a founding member of Collectif EducNum (CNIL), of the GIP cybermalveillance.gouv.fr and France Enfance Protégée (Snated-119), of the Committee of Experts against Harassment (Ministry of National Education), and of the Laboratory for the Protection of Children Online (Elysée-President Macron), and she joined as an expert the Young Audience Committee of French regulator ARCOM and the college of the National Gaming Authority ANJ.

She is a member of the Bureau of the Renaissance Numérique think tank and of The GAP (Good Advertising Project), as well as of the working group "Freedom of expression in the digital age" of the think tank Villa Numeris (with the Samman firm).

Justine works as a French expert on young people's digital uses with national and European institutions, and on advisory committees on the security of digital giants. She is very regularly asked by the media to comment on current events. In December 2020, she was appointed to the French National Order of Merit.





### **Niels-Christian Bilenberg**

### Center for Digital Youth Care, Denmark

Niels-Christian Bilenberg is a specialist consultant with the Center for Digital Youth Care (Denmark), with responsibility for the centre's digital counselling of youths, on the online platforms <u>cyberhus.dk</u> and <u>netstof.dk</u>, with more than 17 years of experience. He also works as an external consultant, offering training of staff and ongoing sparring to municipal, governmental and non-governmental organisations on various aspects of online counselling, and vulnerable online communities.



### **Nel Broothaerts**

### Child Focus, Belgium

Nel Broothaerts graduated as Master in Pedagogical Sciences at the University of Ghent. In 2002, she was responsible for the development of an educational programme for young children in Guatemala. After her return to Belgium, she worked within the education system for children with special needs, where she was responsible for the development of pedagogical tools for teachers.

Between 2005 and 2007, Nel worked within the Youth Service as a home counsellor/ parenting advisor for families in problematic parenting situations. In May 2007, she joined Child Focus and, as project manager, was responsible for the policy and development of prevention initiatives around e-safety. In September 2013, she became coordinator of the project team. In October 2017, she became Chief Prevention and Development Officer, responsible for all prevention initiatives, through tools, materials, education or training, and new developments in the Foundation. Since October 2022, she has combined this position with the role of Deputy CEO of Child Focus. On 1 September 2024, she became CEO of Child Focus.



### **Andy Burrows**

### Molly Rose Foundation, United Kingdom

Andy Burrows is Chief Executive of the <u>Molly Rose Foundation</u>, a tech accountability and suicide prevention charity founded following the death of 14-year-old Molly Russell in November 2017. At Molly's inquest, a coroner ruled that harmful content on social media played a 'not insignificant' contributory role in her death. Andy has an extensive background in online child safety and tech regulation issues, having previously been Head of Online Safety at the NSPCC where he secured the UK Government's commitment to introduce the Online Safety Act. Before that, he worked across a range of regulated markets and sectors, with a specialism in representing the interests of vulnerable consumers and service users.





### **Sharone Franco**

### Yubo, France

Sharone Franco is Yubo's Head of Legal and Public Policy. After a career in corporate law specialising in the technology sector, Sharone joined Yubo to oversee all legal matters and drive the platform's commitment to building a safer internet for its users through meaningful policy-oriented initiatives. Sharone develops strategic relationships and partnerships with leading organisations and public institutions worldwide on behalf of Yubo.



### Internet Matters, United Kingdom

Katie Freeman-Tayler is the Head of Research and Policy at Internet Matters, a UK non-profit dedicated to supporting families in navigating the digital world safely and confidently. With over a decade of experience in research and policy roles in the third and public sectors, Katie leads research initiatives that ensure the voices of parents, children and young people drive the organisation's work. Passionate about reducing inequality and fostering safer online environments, Katie regularly collaborates with industry, government and academic partners to influence forward-thinking digital policy.



### **Gabrielle Gane**

### Paris Psychology Centre, France

Gabrielle Gane is a child and adolescent therapist working at Paris Psychology Centre, France, where she provides integrative and holistic therapeutic support for families and children in the English-speaking community in Paris. She also assists the practice's neuropsychologist with ADHD (attention deficit hyperactivity disorder) and ASD (autism spectrum disorder) assessments for children and adolescents. She holds a Master's of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology from Utrecht University, the Netherlands, and holds a Graduate Membership of the British Psychological Society. Coming from a background in psychology, Gabrielle is passionate about supporting young individuals struggling with emotional, behavioural, academic, and social-cultural difficulties and creating safer environments for children to thrive.

Gabrielle recently published a research article, "Blurring the lines: The vague boundary between mainstream and deviant internet pornography tags for at-risk viewers" in the Journal of Sexual Aggression alongside researchers Dr Paul Watters, Richard Wortley, and Jeremy Prichard. This study explores the potential risk that pornography may have on the healthy psychosexual development of vulnerable users - specifically adolescents and adults at risk of progressing to more deviant and illegal forms of pornography, such as child sexual exploitation material (CSEM). She virtually co-presented the preliminary findings of this study at the Australian Institute of Criminology Conference in 2022.





### **Professor Debbie Ging**

### Dublin City University, Ireland

Debbie Ging is Professor of Digital Media and Gender in the School of Communications at Dublin City University and Director of the DCU Institute for Research on Genders and Sexualities. She teaches and researches on gender, sexuality and digital media, with a focus on digital hate, online anti-feminist men's rights politics, the incel subculture, and radicalisation of boys and men into male supremacist ideologies. Debbie's research also addresses youth experiences of gender-based and sexual abuse online and educational interventions to tackle this issue. She sits on the governmentcommissioned Online Health Taskforce in Ireland and has acted as expert advisor to the Oireachtas Joint Committee on Education + Skills, the UN Special Rapporteur on Violence against Women and Girls, the Radicalization Awareness Network (RAN) of the European Commission, Meta, Scotland Police and the ISPCC, among others. Debbie is Ireland's Corresponding Editor of the journal Men and Masculinities and is a member of the editorial boards of New Media and Society and Feminist Media Studies.

Her research focuses on how digital experiences relate to critical developmental tasks such as body image, sexuality, and identity development, as well as mental health. This includes the development of theoretical frameworks grounded in communication science and psychology, and the uses of multimethod approaches (e.g., focus groups, experimental studies, daily diaries, longitudinal studies).

Chelly's research is supported by competitive grants, including BOF and FWO funds, and she recently secured funding as a co-principal investigator from the prestigious Horizon Europe Framework Programme to develop personalised intervention and prevention programmes for children with visual impairments. In this project, she will investigate the impact of digital media on identity development in visually impaired youth.

Her work has been published extensively in Q1-ranked journals across five domains defined by ISI-WOS, and she has authored eight book chapters on digital media and



youth development. She has presented her research more than 20 times at major international conferences in communication and psychology. Her contributions were recently recognized with a Best Published Article award from the Children, Adolescents, and Media (CAM) Division of the ICA.

Additionally, Chelly is frequently invited to speak at academic and public events (e.g., Eetexpert, 2020; Apenstaartjaren, 2024) and has been featured in various media outlets, including Journaal Laat, Jong Talent in Knack, De Morgen, De Standaard, and the docuseries Chasing Beauty.

She has been involved in several European projects on bullying and cyberbullying and, more recently, on the positive use of ICT among children and adolescents. She has been a member of the European Association of Developmental Psychology Council since 2011, and she was President of the European Association for Developmental Psychology (EADP) from 2017-2019.

Her research area is related to violence and aggressive behaviour in adolescence and childhood, specifically school bullying, peer rejection, dating aggression in romantic relationships, cyberbullying, and risky behaviour in virtual contexts. Within these areas, she has investigated the role of several individual and contextual factors (temperament, moral processes, emotional and cognitive mediators, group dynamics). Another important direction of investigation has been related to translational research in developmental psychology, designing and evaluating school interventions against bullying and cyberbullying in collaboration with the Italian Ministry of Education, local school networks, and international research networks.
